COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH



Wortwell Parish Council, in liaison with Norfolk Police, intends to set up a Community Speed Watch and is looking for village volunteers to come forward to make this happen.

Community Speed Watch is a community operated initiative designed to allow volunteers to officially monitor and report to the Police details of speeding vehicles in areas of concern to the community. Community Speed Watch is not enforcement.

The initiative allows members of the community to address speeding issues by becoming actively involved in road safety, using speed detection equipment to monitor speeds from safe locations. The aim is **NOT** to catch as many speeding drivers as possible but to raise awareness that excessive speeds are socially unacceptable. We aim to reduce speed in areas of concern and address issues from our community by raising awareness.

To set up a scheme:

- We must have a minimum of 6 volunteers.
- All the volunteers must be over 18 years old.
- The scheme must have a Co-ordinator (who will be the point of contact for the team) and where possible a Deputy.
- Volunteers will have to sign a Community Speed Watch agreement and be vetted.
- Equipment will be provided by the Constabulary
- Training will be provided on using the equipment and on Health and Safety issues.
- Volunteers will be covered by the Constabulary's insurance.
- Locations chosen will assessed by the Constabulary.

OUR NATURE RECOVERY

The Government has set a target to build back nature in a 25-Year-Plan. However, time is not on our planet's side and immediate action is needed. They are encouraging County Councils to define and implement Local Nature Recovery Strategies to deliver a Nature Recovery Network across the country. Norfolk and Suffolk County Councils are working together on our regional Strategies. They are looking at both a top-down and bottom-up approach. The top-down element will be driven by national, regional and local government. The bottom-up element will be driven by the people.



Harleston has already implemented a bottom-up framework with their 'Nature Recovery in Harleston' initiative. In 2022, following the adoption of the Neighbourhood Plan, Redenhall with Harleston Town Council took an imaginative step by declaring the parish to be its own local Nature Recovery Area.

This is a community driven non-bureaucratic effort where everyone has a role to play. It provides a 'badge' under which we can work together. Every positive thing we do to help the natural world, from feeding the birds and planting wildflowers to leaving rough areas in gardens, they all count. The garden area in England is much larger than that of our national nature reserves. The total effect can be far greater than we would initially think.

Many people are already acting in their own gardens. The badge will offer a means to bring together these small acts. It gives us all a voice.

PUMPKIN PIE

For the pastry

Sweet shortcrust pastry case <u>or</u> A packet of ready made sweet shortcrust pastry



For the pumpkin pie filling

450g/1lb prepared weight pumpkin flesh, peeled and cut into 2.5cm chunks

2 large eggs plus 1 yolk (use the white for another dish)

75g/3oz soft dark brown sugar

1 tsp ground cinnamon

½ level teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

½ tsp ground allspice

½ tsp ground cloves

½ tsp ground ginger

275ml/10fl oz double cream

Method

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 200C/400F/Gas 6.
- 2. If using a shop bought sweet crust pastry case, use one that is 23cm/9in diameter and 4cm/1½in deep. If using your own pastry, roll it out and use it to line a 23cm/9in pie plate (not loose bottomed). Bake the pastry case blind for 20 minutes.
- 3. To make the filling, place the pumpkin chunks on a baking tray, cover with foil and roast until tender. This will take about 20-30 minutes, depending on your pumpkin. Press the cooked pumpkin in a coarse sieve and to extract any excess water. Set aside to cool before blending in a food processor, or mashing by hand to a pureé.
- 4. Lightly whisk the eggs and extra yolk together in a large bowl.
- 5. Place the sugar, spices and the cream in a pan, bring to simmering point, giving it a whisk to mix everything together. Then pour it over the eggs and whisk it again briefly. Now add the pumpkin pureé, still whisking to combine everything thoroughly.
- 6. Reduce the oven temperature to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Pour the filling into your pastry case and bake for 35-40 minutes, by which time it will puff up round the edges but still feel slightly wobbly in the centre.
- Remove the pie from the oven and place the tin on a wire cooling rack. Serve warm or chilled (stored loosely covered in foil in the fridge) with some chilled créme fraïche or whipped cream.

Top 10 Gardening Jobs for September & October

September

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean out cold `frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetables crops with bird-proof netting
- 10. Plant spring flowering bulbs

October

- 1. Divide established rhubarb crowns to create new plants
- 2. Cut back perennials that have died down
- 3. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory
- 5. Plant out spring cabbages
- Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts
- 7. Prune climbing roses
- 8. Finish collecting seeds from the garden to sow next year
- 9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas
- 10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf
